As a result of the grant received by the ASC for a new groomer, the AIA avoided the cost to replace our groomer. This is because we lease the ASC groomer at a very reasonable rate to groom our filing roads. The ASC also grooms the snowmobile trails in our area for the state parks. So, it is important for everyone to support the ASC by joining. Even if you don't snowmobile up-country, everyone benefits from the ASC. If you cross country ski or snowshoe on the filing roads, or park your snowmobile on the hill in the parking lot, you benefit form the efforts and services offered by the club. Our emergency and fire services also rely on our roads being groomed. Your visiting family and friends benefit as well. All of this also helps our property values even for those who choose not to use their Arrowhead property in the winter. ASC is an integral part of our unique mountain community and I'd ask for all that have not joined or renewed this year to do so. Look for the ASC link on the AIA website for information on joining.

I look forward to leading the Board in meeting our community's future business and challenges.



Now that we have survived the holiday season, we're looking forward to a smooth transition for the rest of our winter season. Our winter parking lot reached its full capacity during the holiday season, which happens each year. We had to <u>stress</u> courtesy and discipline, when parking in the winter parking lot. Please follow the winter parking lot rules, by not leaving your snowmobiles/UTV's and trailers parked for lengthy periods of time in the parking lot when owners are gone. The South row from the diesel parking is designated for "Trucks with Trailers Only" as this needs to accommodate trucks with large box trailers. Otherwise, they have to park alongside the East bank of the parking lot and this will limit space for <u>all</u> traffic and heavy equipment.

I am sad to report, acts of Hit & Run/Vandalism with extensive damage were committed to vehicles in our parking lot, and these incidents were reported to Security. Since no one admitted to this heinous act or left a note behind, and with no witnesses, it's hard to determine who the culprit is. Security does provide property owners with an incident report with pictures, to submit with their insurance claims.

As you all know, we have had a poor accumulation of snow this winter season. Our roads were officially closed on December 23rd, last month. Some property owners have chosen to drive back in to the subdivision because of the lack of snow. Please be advised, that you are doing this at your own risk in case you get stuck and cannot get out of your driveway. Security's concern is <u>SAFETY</u>; please drive very slow, especially around curves and corners on the filing roads. It would not be a good situation if a vehicle and snowmobile met while coming around a corner. Security has placed a "No Parking" sign at the bottom of Ute and the Alpine Road. The reason being, any vehicles parked there will interfere with the grooming operations and this area is also designated for a rendezvous point to meet the Ambulance in case of an emergency.

During the winter parking lot snow removal operation, please do not park your vehicles between the signs that say "No Parking next 300 feet, Helicopter landing zone".

The speed limit inside the Arrowhead subdivision is 20 MPH, contrary to the rumor floating around that in the winter time you can go faster on your snowmobile. Not true!! The posted speed limit of 20 MPH applies year round. If you choose to go faster than the posted speed limit, don't be surprised when you find a Security vehicle behind you, because you are Busted!

When snowmobiling, please be courteous to <u>all</u> pedestrians and cross-country skiers and keep off of the cross-country ski trails with your snowmobile.

The Arrowhead Volunteer Fire Department would like to address three topics in this Smoke Signals: the below average snow pack and how it may affect the upcoming fire season at Arrowhead, the availability of private landowner defensible space grants, and the upcoming snowshoe golf event.

The snowpack is very low, but hopefully this situation will change. The USDA January 2012 snowpack report currently has our area in the 50 – 69% of average snowpack category. In fact, most of the mountain west from the Colorado/New Mexico border north to Montana is in this category. What does this mean for Arrowhead? This could indicate that the fire danger at Arrowhead may be higher than average this summer. It also means that the initial mutual aid responses to wildland fire incidents may not be as strong and quick, if local fire resources are spread out over the west due to a heavy fire season. For Arrowhead specifically, we should ensure that our fire department is fully prepared to suppress any wildland fire incidents in our district as quickly as possible. More importantly, every resident and visitor to Arrowhead should have a heightened awareness to fire prevention. As the fire season nears, the AVFD will review the live fuel moistures for the area and conduct regular Arrowhead specific fine dead fuel moisture readings. Based on the findings of those readings, the AVFD will implement any restrictions that may be necessary. If the current snowpack conditions do not change, the AVFD would like to ask all residents and visitors to pay very close attention to the fire danger rating for Arrowhead and check the AIA website for any fire restrictions prior to enjoying fires this summer.

The AVFD has become aware of the possibility of some private landowner defensible space grants offered by the Western Region Wildfire Council for 2012. Our initial investigation into these grants has revealed that to be eligible for grant consideration:

- The land to be mitigated must be located in an extreme or very high fire danger area outlined in an approved community-wide wildland fire prevention plan (CWPP).
- The landowner must supply three bids from three separate contractors.
- The landowner must supply a detailed map of the mitigation area.
- The landowner must supply pictures of the proposed mitigation area.
- Prior to receiving grant funds, successful grant recipients must have an onsite inspection of the mitigation area by the Colorado State Forest Service to ensure work has been completed to the grant standards.

Also:

- Grants funds MAY PAY UP TO 90% of contractor bid with landowner paying 10%. (Grants are not guaranteed to be 90/10).
- Work must be completed within 90 days of becoming a successful grant recipient.
- Defensible space mitigation must meet the grant standards. (Both the AVFD and AIA Forest Manager are currently working to see how those standards might compare to the current Arrowhead standards.)
- Private landowners must complete their own grant application. The AVFD would be happy to supply the information needed to contact the Western Region Wildfire Council and inform private landowners where to obtain copies of community-wide wildland fire prevention plans.

Finally, the AVFD would like to invite everyone to the annual snowshoe golf tournament to be held Saturday March 17th at 1:00 p.m.. Please meet at the fire station. This event is being held on a Saturday so that all residents, full time or not, can attend. I would like to thank Jim and Barbara Darnell (coordinators), Joan Aufderheide (food coordinator), Linda Dysart (awards coordinator), and everyone else that works toward making this event happen.

MOUNTAIN HEALTH

This month I thought about several subjects. Diabetes won out. It is important for the diabetic to be aware that altitude can change the need for insulin and work with your physician to adjust your dose. You may increase your exercise and need to plan accordingly. We do a lot of walking at Arrowhead. We all need to be aware of the signs and symptoms for diabetic reactions.

Type I diabetes:

This is insulin dependent diabetes and older terms include juvenile diabetes, sugar diabetes or brittle diabetes. The beta cells in the pancreas don't produce insulin or not enough and insulin must be injected several times a day. The diabetic will also need to test blood sugar several times a day to determine the dose of insulin. Normal blood sugar range is 70 to 130. These numbers vary and should be set by your personal physician. Warning signs for diabetes are, increased thirst, increased hunger, increased urination, dry mouth, unexplained weight loss, fatigue, blurred vision and headaches.

Type II diabetes:

This is non insulin dependent, usually adult onset. The beta cells may still produce insulin in small quantities or cells become resistant to insulin. Oral medications are used to treat this type of diabetes, but blood sugar testing may still be needed.

There are two types of reactions for the diabetic.


Hypoglycemic or low blood sugar. The blood sugar falls below 70. Symptoms are sweating, headache, blurred vision, hunger, numbness and tingling of the skin. This has a rapid onset and can lead to fainting and seizures. It is an emergency and should be treated immediately.

Treatment includes giving 15 mg of carbohydrate. It could be 3 glucose tablets, 4 oz. of fruit juice or non-diet soda, 1 Tbs sugar in water, 1 Tbs of honey or syrup or 5-6 hard candies. Do not try to give oral sugar to a person that is unconscious, call 911 for medical help.

Hyperglycemia or high blood sugar. The blood sugar is above 180. Symptoms include shortness of breath, a sweet fruity smell on the breath, nausea and vomiting, and confusion. This occurs when a person has forgotten to take medicine, or eats more than the dose of insulin can treat, or hasillness or stress. Treatment includes drinking water and exercise to use up excess sugar. You should **never** exercise if blood sugar is over 240. Insulin is prescribed according to the blood sugar levels and insulin can be used to treat this condition, but must be administered under physicians orders. This has a slow onset and takes longer to show symptoms.

The purpose for this discussion is not for you to try and diagnose, but to understand why and which treatment is used. Diabetics should wear some form of medical identification to alert people if treatment is needed. If you are diabetic be sure to carry the sugar needed to treat low blood sugar. Be prepared for emergencies.


Remember that sugar is used to treat low blood sugar and the onset is rapid. Sugar given to a person with high blood sugar is not harmful as high blood sugar has a slow onset and treatment can be given later.



Crested Butte

In the 1860s and 1870s coal and silver mining towns opened in the Crested Butte area of Colorado. However, when silver mining hit on hard times, many of these towns failed. Crested Butte was in a better position to survive because it served as a supply town to the surrounding area. Today, Crested Butte retains its Old West charms. Crested Butte Mountain Resort is famous for its skiing and snowboarding in winter. Great restaurants and pubs greet you after a day on the slopes!

Crested Butte is one of the locations where mountain biking is claimed to have started. Other popular summer activities in Crested Butte include hiking, backpacking, rock climbing, whitewater rafting and kayaking, 4 wheeling, disc golfing and fishing. No matter what season, a mere 2 hours from Arrowhead, Crested Butte is a great destination!



Ouray

Not one of the lucky 1%? Once famous for America's richest goldmine, Ouray,- under two hours from Arrowhead- is a great place to soak your financial worries away! Once the stopping place for the Ute indians, the hot springs here now host tourists. Whether you choose the Orvis Hot Springs, the Wiesbaden Hotel and Spa or the city's own hot springs pool, you are sure to find a place to relax and unwind. Ouray is famous for the sport of ice climbing, hosting an Ice Climbing Festival in January where anyone can learn to ice climb from the world's best! www.ouraycolorado.com



ASK THE VET

Why is my pet drinking more water recently?

Increased thirst accompanied with increased urination can be a sign of a serious underlying disease in your pet. The two main causes of increased thirst are diabetes and kidney disease /failure. There are two types of diabetes; diabetes insipidus and diabetes mellitus [sugar diabetes]. Diabetes mellitus is the more common form in animals and has many similarities to human diabetes. In both dogs and cats the disease has a tendency to develop in middle age, overweight pets with some dog breeds being more susceptible. The clinical signs are increased water consumption, increased urination, increased appetite, while losing weight and cloudy eyes [cataracts]. The disease can be easily diagnosed with a blood test and or urinalysis. Treatment can be challenging, but in most cases, the prognoses is favorable and can sometimes be controlled with diet and oral medication alone, but usually will involve injections of insulin.

The second major cause of increased thirst is progressive or acute kidney failure. Most statistics show that kidney failure is the second major cause of death in older dogs and cats, just behind cancer. The causes are varied with infection, auto immune disease and chronic degeneration of the kidney over time. Diagnosis, as with diabetes, is best determined by a blood test and urinalysis. Treatment may include special diets low in protein and

phosphorus, medications that lower blood flow to the kidney and reduce blood pressure, antibiotics and fluid therapy to reduce dehydration.

Both of these conditions are treatable and the prognosis is much improved if diagnosis and treatment are started early in the course of the disease. So if you feel your four-legged family member seems to be drinking more water than normal, don't delay a trip to the Vet for a check up to rule out these disease conditions

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
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
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
